Celebration Amidst Tribulation

Did you ever tell yourself: "When I just get through this, then I will celebrate..." or "As soon as I push through this big crisis

at work, I will give time to my family..." or "When I retire, then I will do the things I always wanted to do and have not..."? Envisioning a better future is the keystone of resilience. However, we can fall into the trap of deferring that which is important but does not seem urgent to us. The truth is, the urgencies will find us, but if we are not careful, we may put off that which is most important. The Purim Story and the Passover Story show us different aspects of this tension.

Persia is a perpetual party in the Book of Esther. Achashverosh outsources the governance of the empire to others, such as Haman and Mordechai, while he focuses his energies on hedonistic pursuits. The Megillah portrays this earthly king as irresponsible and dissolute. Mordechai, Esther and their nemeses, Haman and Zeresh, are people of action. They also attend, plan and declare feasts. Happily, Esther's feast prevails! The celebrations of Purim might seem oddly timed in view of the evil intentions Haman harbored for our people, yet the ability to celebrate our "wins" is a key element of emotional and spiritual hardiness. We aim to transmit gratitude and preparedness rather than trauma to the next generation.

The First Passover Seder takes place in the Land of Goshen, under the jurisdiction of Pharaoh's crumbling power structure. The Israelites celebrate freedom from the

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Emanuel Family:

My last missive to you in this publication was a timely reminder of how our days have been less



predictable. In the last issue, I asked you to come back to synagogue, but then we had to close our doors. Who knew? I now write to you six weeks before March publication. Let's hope by the time you read this we will be enjoying each other's company in person again!

Today, however, we face a new challenge and that is membership. We are a building fit for 1,000 families and yet we have approximately 600 members. Our membership is aging. My family has been a member for 38 years. Others in our congregation eclipse that by far. As President of the Board of Trustees I have heard and appreciate that younger Board members do not feel as if their voices matter. We shall survive as a strong Congregation only if younger people become members, join the Board and/ or committees and ascend to positions of leadership. To this end, Vice President Michalee Merritt chaired a group of committed members and leaders to develop a strategic plan for our next five years. We surveyed both congregants and groups who are mostly unaffiliated with synagogues. We learned quite a bit. The most important issue that emerged: how to grow and how to be affordable?

There are barriers to entry in any member-based organization. In trying to find out how that applies to The Emanuel, we learned there is a thirst for Jewish affiliation but we have to meet these folks where they are. We

hired an engagement coordinator to draw in potential members with specific events. We know we have a terrific Religious School, but that is insufficient if we cannot attract young members. The number one problem potential members expressed is the high cost of dues. Those of us who are retired often lose sight of what it takes when two people are working to support a family. We also need to appreciate that the pandemic has made most people's lives more difficult, and in some cases more costly.

The first step the Committee recommended to the Board of Trustees was a change in the dues structure to recognize the above reality. Seventy-three percent of those surveyed said we need to make dues more affordable to young singles and families. The Board voted unanimously to institute a plan that allows first time new members (not previously an Emanuel member) a

meaningful modified dues structure. This structure allows the new family or single member to start their membership at approximately one/ fifth of current membership dues. It will increase by that amount each year until the member is paying full dues. Our hope is that in five years the member(s) will clearly see the value of their synagogue and be desirous of staying a part of our Kehilla.

Despite the pandemic, we have engaged our members, even while limiting in-person attendance, through education in our Religious School, Adult Education programs and classes, Religious Services, Rabbis' Tribute, Ben Engel's new play, "Havdalah," Trivia Nights, Vodka & Latkes, Camp Reunions, Movie Nights, Friday Night Shabbat Under the Stars and more. As we returned to our Sanctuary in the beginning of 2021, you could feel the excitement of a family reunion build to beautiful High Holidays. While the

PREPARING FOR PESACH: HELPFUL GUIDELINES

The Torah prohibits the ownership of *hametz* (leaven) during Pesah. Therefore, we arrange for the sale of the *hametz* to a non-Jew. The transfer, *mekhirat hametz*, is accomplished by appointing an agent, usually the rabbi, to handle the sale. It is valid and legal transfer of ownership. At the end of the holiday, the agent arranges for the reversion of ownership of the now-permitted *hametz*. If ownership of the *hametz* was not transferred before the holiday, the use of this *hametz* is prohibited after the holiday as well (*hametz she-avar alav ha-Pesah*).

Since the Torah prohibits the eating of *hametz* during Pesah, and since many common foods contain some admixture of *hametz*, guidance is necessary when shopping and preparing for Pesah.

During the eight days of Pesah, *hametz* cannot lose its identity in an admixture. Therefore, the minutest amount of *hametz* renders the whole admixture *hametz* and its use on Pesah is prohibited. However, during the rest of the year, *hametz* follows the normal rules of admixture, i.e., it loses its identity in an admixture of one part *hametz* and sixty parts of non-*hametz* (*hatel be-shishim*). This affords us the opportunity to differentiate between foods purchased before and during Pesah.

What follows is a general guideline. However, your rabbi should be consulted when any doubt arises. *Kosher le-Pesah* labels that do not bear the name of a rabbi or one of the recognized symbols of rabbinic supervision, or which are not integral to the package, should not be used without consulting your rabbi.

PROHIBITED FOODS

Prohibited foods include the following: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereal, coffees containing cereal derivatives, wheat, barley, oats, spelt, rye, and all liquids containing ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol.

In the past, most Ashkenazic authorities have added the following foods (*kitniyot*) to the above list: rice, corn, millet, legumes (beans and peas; however, string beans are permitted). The Committee on Jewish Law and Standards has ruled unanimously that peanuts and peanut oil are permissible. Some Ashkenazic authorities permit, while others forbid, the use of legumes in a form other than their natural state, for example, corn sweeteners, corn oil, soy oil. Sephardic authorities permit the use of all of the above. Rabbi Small permits the use of legumes on Passover and advises hosts to be sensitive to the customs of their family and guests.

PERMITTED FOODS

A. The following foods require no *kosher le-Pesah* label if purchased prior to Pesah: unopened packages or containers of natural coffee without cereal additives (However, be aware that coffees produced by General Foods are not

kosher for Passover unless marked KP); sugar, pure tea (not herbal tea); salt (not iodized); pepper; natural spices; frozen fruit juices with no additives; frozen (uncooked) vegetables (for legumes see above); milk; butter; cottage cheese; cream cheese; ripened cheeses such as cheddar (hard), muenster (semi-soft) and Camembert (soft); frozen (uncooked) fruit (with no additives); baking soda.

B. The following foods require no *kosher le-Pesah* label if purchased before or during Pesah: Fresh fruits and vegetables (for legumes see above), eggs, fresh fish and fresh meat.

C. The following foods require a *kosher le-Pesah* label if purchased before or during Pesah: All baked products (matzah, cakes, matzah flour, farfel, matzah meal, and any products containing matzah); canned or bottled fruit juices (These juices are often clarified with kitniyot which are not listed among the ingredients. However, if one knows there are no such agents, the juice may be purchased prior to Pesah without a *kosher le-Pesah* label; canned tuna (since tuna, even when packed in water, has often been processed in vegetable broth and/or hydrolyzed protein-however, if it is known that the tuna is packed exclusively in water, without any additional ingredients or additives, it may be purchased without a *kosher le-Pesah* label); wine; vinegar; liquor; oils; dried fruits; candy; chocolate flavored milk; ice cream; yogurt and soda.

D. The following processed foods (canned, bottled or frozen), require a *kosher le-Pesah* label if purchased during Pesah: milk, butter, juices, vegetables, fruit, milk products, spices, coffee, tea, and fish, as well as all foods listed in Category C.

DETERGENTS: If permitted during the year, powdered and liquid detergents do not require a *kosher le-Pesah* label.

MEDICINE: Since *hametz* binders are used in many pills, the following guidelines should be followed: If the medicine is required for life sustaining therapy, it may be used on Pesah. If it is not for life sustaining therapy, some authorities permit, while others prohibit. Consult your rabbi. In all cases, capsules are preferable to pills.

DISHES AND UTENSILS

Kashering of Utensils: The process of kashering utensils depends on how the utensils are used. According to halakhah, leaven can be purged from a utensil by the same process in which it was absorbed in the utensil (*kevoleo kakh poleto*). Therefore, utensils used in cooking are kashered by boiling, those used in broiling are kashered by fire and heat, and those used only for cold food are kashered by rinsing.

- **A. Earthenware** (china, pottery, etc.) may not be kashered. However, fine translucent chinaware which has not been used for over a year may be used if scoured and cleaned in hot water.
- **B.** Metal (wholly made of metal) Utensils Used in Fire (spit, broiler) must first be thoroughly scrubbed and cleansed and then made as hot as possible. Those used for cooking or eating (silverware, pots) must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned and completely immersed in boiling water. Pots should have water boiled in them which will overflow the rim.

The utensils should not be used for a period of at least 24 hours between cleaning and the immersions of boiling water. Metal baking utensils cannot be kashered.

C. Ovens and Ranges: Every part that comes in contact with food must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned. Then, oven and range should be heated as hot as possible for a half hour. If there is a broil setting, use it. Self-cleaning ovens should be scrubbed and cleaned and then put through the self-cleaning cycle. Continuous ovens must be kashered the same way as regular ovens.

Microwave Ovens, which do not cook the food by means of heat, should be cleaned, and then a cup of water should be placed inside. Then the oven should be turned on until the water disappears. A microwave oven that has a browning element cannot be kashered for Pesach.

- **D.** Glassware: Authorities disagree as to the method for kashering drinking utensils. One opinion requires soaking in water for three days, changing the water every 24 hours. The other opinions requires only a thorough scrubbing before Pesach, or putting them through a dishwasher.
- **E. Dishwasher:** After not using the machine for a period of 24 hours, a full cycle with detergent should be run.
- **F.** Electrical Appliances: If the parts that come into contact with *bametz* are removable, they can be kashered in the appropriate way (if metal, follow the rules for metal utensils). If the parts are not removable, the appliance cannot be kashered. (All exposed parts should be thoroughly cleaned.)
- **G. Tables, Closets and Counters:** If used with *hametz*, they should be thoroughly cleaned and covered, and then they may be used.
- **H. Kitchen Sink:** A metal sink can be kashered by thoroughly cleaning and then pouring boiling water over it. A porcelain sink should be cleaned and a sink rack used. If, however, dishes are to be soaked in a porcelain sink, a dish basin must be used.
- **I.** *Hametz* and **Non-Passover Utensils:** Non-Passover dishes, pots and *hametz* whose ownership has been transferred, should be separated, locked up or covered, and marked in order to prevent accidental use.

SELLING HAMETZ

The Torah instructs that in observing Pesach all leaven must be removed from one's home or destroyed. To protect against excessive waste and financial hardship, the Rabbis permit the individual to sell <u>hametz</u> to a non-Jew until Passover is complete. It is traditional at that time to make a contribution to the <u>Maot Hittim</u>, the Passover Fund, which helps needy Jews purchase the necessities to celebrate Pesach and helps other hungry and disadvantaged people.

inside of their slave quarters in Egypt. This remarkable act of chutzpah enacts the freeing of the collective minds of Israel before their bodies are completely free. The painting of the doorposts and the partaking of roast lamb — a food that is not provided by the taskmasters but is from the flocks the Israelites brought with them from Canaan effects the first step of liberation. Free your mind and the rest will follow. This is what the Psalmist means in Ps. 23, "You set a table for me in the presence of my enemies..." When I can sit at my own table and celebrate my freedom, in that moment, in that hour, I am free. For Pesach, the act of celebration precedes the realization of freedom. Thus, it cannot wait until "things calm down." It is precisely amidst the chaos of darkness and death of the final Plagues that our ancestors sit down and toast "L'chayim! To our Maker or Liberator and to our own freedom, dignity and self-determination."

This year, let us celebrate, amidst the uncertainty and perils of our own day. Let us not wait to rejoice for the ideals, the history and the relationships we hold most dear. Your Emanuel leadership is here to help you raise spirits and rejoice.

In January and February, we continued our exploration of Jewish communities around the world with virtual tours of Rome and Spain and a presentation about the Jewish National Fund's Galilee Culinary Institute. We also learned about the history of Jews in American theater and the tragic story of the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire, and the fire safety legislation that was enacted after the fire. In addition, Connie Smilowitz led a group in practicing Yiddish skills with weekly readings from a Yiddish text.

COMING UP:

- Wednesday, March 2, 11 a.m.: Last session of eightweek Yiddish program with Connie Smilowitz.
- Thursday, March 3, 8:30 p.m.: An Old Faith in the New World: The History of American Judaism the first in a series American Judaism: Past, Present and Future. Prof. Jonathan Sarna of Brandeis

University and author of *American Judaism*: A *History*, will give a lively presentation on American Judaism from 1654 to the present. Beginning in the colonial era, Sarna recounts the dynamic story of people struggling to be



Americans and Jews. He shows how each generation of American Jews has had to wrestle anew with the question of whether its own children and grandchildren will remain Jewish. Bringing the story down to the present, he illustrates how the past can both inform and inspire.

- Sunday, March 6, 2 p.m.: Adult Ed/Sisterhood Virtual Art Program The Art of Purim will show wall paintings from the 3rd century CE and illuminated manuscripts, groggers, and contemporary artworks from around the world, that celebrate the story of Purim.
- Sunday, March 20, 1 p.m.: Learn about The Jewish Community of South Africa from its creation in 1841 to the present with Craig Nudelman, the director of Mother City Jewish Tours.
- Thursday, March 31, 8:30 p.m.: The second in the American Judaism series, American Jews & White Supremacy: The Present Dilemmas of an Unstable History. During the last five years, Americans have reckoned anew with the history of this



country's racism and what that history requires from the present. In this talk, Prof. Lila Corwin Berman of Temple University asks how American Jews fit — or do not fit



— in these often painful and polarizing conversations. She argues that older debates about whether Jews were "white" should be supplanted by newer efforts to ask how whiteness organizes power and when and how Jews have been included in or excluded

from that racialized system of American power.

• Sunday, April 3, 12:00 p.m.: A Virtual Walking Tour of Venice's Jewish Ghetto with Luisella Romeo, a registered tourist guide who lives and works in Venice, where her family has lived since the mid-1700s. The ancient Jewish ghetto in Venice is in the Cannaregio district, dating back to 1516, one of the most authentic Venetian areas in the city, and yet quite unknown to

tourists. We will try to understand what distinguished this area from all other Jewish quarters in Europe at that time as well as learn the history of the Venetian Jewish community.

• Sunday, April 24, 12:30 p.m.: A Virtual

Tour of Jewish Prague with Bonita Rhoads and Vadim Erent of Insight Cities. A rare livestream tour through

Prague's ancient Jewish Quarter. Including a journey through the interior of the oldest functioning synagogue in all of Europe, the 13th-century Old New Synagogue, the 600-year-old Jewish Cemetery and the haunting interior of the



Baroque Pinkas synagogue, painted with the names of the thousands of Czech Jews lost to the Holocaust, and the Klausen synagogue which houses one of the world's largest collections of Judaica. You'll enjoy stories of the unique culture and essential contributions of Czech Jewish figures, even while you learn of the enduring persecution the community faced, tragically culminating in genocide and cold war suppression in the 20th century.

Using Your IRA for CHARITABLE GIVING
