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FROM THE PRESIDENT

The following remarks are excerpted from a speech delivered by Emanuel President Reesa F. Olins on Kol Nidre 5784.

How do I encourage each one of you to open your pockets and make a Kol Nidre pledge? It is very



important to me and many of you sitting here that

The Emanuel Synagogue has a strong and viable future. It is a fact that the number of Jewish families living in our area is on the decline and some of those Jewish families believe, unlike all of you, that they have little need for a synagogue.

That thinking could potentially lead to the end of synagogue life as we know it. But, as most of you know, synagogue life, whether you attend a few days a year or every week of the year, is vital to us to maintain our Jewish identity.

The Emanuel is the place where our children and grandchildren are being taught to love and embrace Judaism and enjoy the many wonderful holidays and traditions.

I am pleased to tell you that we are a thriving congregation having welcomed more than 50 new families — totaling close to 180 people in the past year. Our members are referring their friends — and recently joined members are referring their friends because they feel so welcomed and embraced by clergy, staff, and lay leaders. We are known in the wider Jewish community as **THE PLACE TO BE!**

The Emanuel is the place where we celebrate together — holidays, mitzvahs, and other joyous occasions.

The Emanuel is the place to come together to support others in happy times, to rally together to help others in need, and console one another when a loss of a loved one must be confronted. Our amazing clergy are always here for us!

The Emanuel is the place where

we meet new friends and have a sense of belonging.

The Emanuel is the place where we can address larger Jewish concerns and social issues by addressing anti-Semitism, engaging in Tikkun Olam, and supporting inclusion and civility.

The Emanuel is the place where we form a new link in the chain of Jewish tradition, carrying on values for future generations to inherit while at the same time, being creative, innovative, and welcoming.

The Emanuel is the place where we create meaningful moments moments of joy, understanding, reflection, and kindness.

The Emanuel Synagogue is important for many reasons. It is a special community which plays an important role in our lives. We welcome and value members of another faith or cultural background who choose to become Jewish or to closely associate with the Jewish people.

It is hard to be Jewish alone.

Through a congregation, one's Jewish life experience is enhanced and expanded by partnering with a community that is lasting and offers a rich menu of experiences throughout the year. At The Emanuel, there are programs for everyone from monthly community Shabbat dinners, Adult Education programs, Religious School family programs, Brotherhood breakfasts and Sisterhood events, Hanukkah and Purim parties, Scotch in the Sukkah, Passover Wine Tasting and for our young children — Kibbitz & Nosh, Tot Shabbat, and Shabbat Jams.

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THE EMANUEL PLAYERS ARE BACK WITH DOMITILLA ON NOVEMBER 19, 2023

The Emanuel Players will return to the stage Sunday, Nov. 19, with a staged reading of Ben Engel's latest play, *Domitilla*. The performance will be at 7 p.m., with a dessert reception following.

The play recreates encounters between Jewish and Roman leaders in 95 CE, when four Talmud rabbis went to Rome on a diplomatic mission. Working both sides is Domitilla, a

member of the Imperial family living an openly Jewish life in Rome, together with her husband Flavius Clemens. "These Roman aristocrats adhered to Judaism during the violent and unstable reign of their relative, the Emperor Domitian," Engel said.

The play also continues the story of Rabbi Joshua ben Hananiah, which Engel began to tell in his 2016 play, *Rabbi* of the Stars. The playwright said he admires Rabbi Joshua for his wisdom and moderation. "The allure of Domitilla, the rabbis' early exposure to a foundational Western culture, and the opportunity to continue Rabbi Joshua's story proved irresistible as I contemplated this play," Engel said.

The play is part of The Arts at The Emanuel, a program of plays and concerts at the synagogue.

The rabbis' trip is described in the Talmud, but not in great detail. "I admit I've embroidered on the known facts in creating this human and political drama, and I hope you'll enjoy the result," Engel said. "The question is, what was Domitilla really like? What was Rabbi Akiva really like? What did his wife think of Domitilla? Come find out. It will be an entertaining evening," Engel said.

Leading the cast will be **Esther Aronson** as the beautiful and conflicted Flavia Domitilla; **David Epstein** as her husband, Flavius Clemens; and **Eric Hoffman** as her lover, the brilliant and ambitious Rabbi Akiva. **Lesley Weiner** will play Akiva's courageous wife, Rachel bat Joshua. Heading for Rome along with Akiva will be **Rabbi Steven Chatinover** as Rabbi Joshua, **Rabbi David Small** and **Mel Simon. Elizabeth Ehrlich, Debbie Mehlman, Fred Spaeth** and **Ken Simon** complete the cast, and **Carolyn Topol** will be the Narrator. The play is produced by **Ken Simon, Alan Parker**, and **Marsha Wolfberg**, and directed by **Adrian A. Durlester**.

In the run-up to the production, on **Wednesday, Nov. 8**, Emanuel will host **Dr. Steven D. Fraade**, Mark Taper Professor Emeritus Of Religious Studies at Yale, a scholar of the period. Fraade's 7:30 p.m. presentation, which will be free and open to the public, is titled: "Rabbis and Romans." Dr. Fraade will comment on a variety of topics relevant to the play, and then take questions from Engel and the audience. The event will be co-sponsored by the Emanuel Synagogue Adult Education Committee.

"A playwright wants a big crowd so I hope you'll come and bring friends, and of course donate to the Emanuel so we can keep doing this," Engel said. He noted that

the play is an important fundraiser for the synagogue and asked people to consider higher level donations as described on the website.

MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR L'HITRAOT AS WE HEAD HOME TO ISRAEL

I have served as your Executive Director for almost four years, but I never written a column for The Emanuel's newsletter. Previous presidents tried to convince me to write one, but I never felt comfortable doing so. English, after all, is not my mother tongue. (If I could write in Hebrew, it would be a different story.)

I decided to step out of my comfort zone and explain why we have decided to make Aliyah and what is going on in my heart and mind as we prepare to return home, to Israel.

We arrived in the U.S. in 2016 with our two young daughters, then ages 12 and 13. I must admit the beginning was full of difficulties and challenges, especially for the girls, whom we cut off from friends, a cozy and familiar home and a warm and loving family. We brought them to the U.S. — a foreign/unfamiliar new place, far from everyone they love, with no English skills, no friends and no family. It took them several years to adapt, learn English, make new friends, and feel more comfortable in the U.S. When Mai (our older daughter) finished high school, it was clear she was going back to Israel to serve in the IDF, and then Leonne (our younger daughter) finished high school, and she also made Aliyah and volunteered to serve in the IDF. As of today, both girls live in Israel and both serve meaningful roles in the IDF.

I came to the Emanuel Synagogue for a job, but I was happy to find much more than just a job--I found a family! Simi and I have no family in the area, so in practice we have adopted the Emanuel community as our family. We have made many new friends, who will, without a doubt, remain our lifelong friends.

For me, Emanuel never felt like a typical workplace but more like a warm and embracing home. Every morning I came to the office with joy and a smile. I never worked for a nonprofit organization, so coming from a for-profit market and getting used to having so many bosses was certainly a challenge. I needed to make several adjustments, however, it certainly helped having such a professional and talented office staff, clergy, custodians, senior staff, lay leaders and devoted volunteers to work with.

I want to thank my devoted staff: Lisa Lenkiewicz, Lisa Taylor, Kathy Hart, Joe Ward (and the custodians), Josh

Cohen and Wendy Greco for being here, day in and day out, taking care of business and making it all look so easy. But do not be fooled. What we do here is not easy; but it is fun, and we do it all with a lot of integrity, care and love.

I found myself constantly juggling between short-term plans/goals and long-term visions. How to keep the Emanuel focused on the best nearterm operation challenges, while always remembering the need to build a better future for the synagogue. I hope that I was able to find a good balance between the two, by managing the synagogue with the utmost professionalism, efficiency, and effectiveness with a great dose of love, caring, compassion and empathy.

I worked hard to meet most of our important goals and objectives as your Executive Director, and hopefully was able to place the Emanuel Synagogue in a much better position for years to come.

I hope I was able to bring some of my for-profit experience and practices to the Emanuel Synagogue, helping in securing our future for many more years. We signed a long-term lease agreement with The Children Museum Preschool and Museum. We established a culture of structured

fundraising programs such as The Rabbi's Tribute, Israel 75, and the current Torah Scroll Repair Project.

The foundation of the Strategic Committee, which led to the formation of the Membership Committee, currently chaired by Michalee Merritt, has been able to recruit a significant number of new members and families with children. Thanks to that, and to the efforts of our school principal, Barbara Fink, and our Hazzan, Daniella Risman, our Hebrew School has grown significantly - reaching record numbers of students as compared with the numbers from the early pandemic days. We have elevated our facility rental program, which is generating considerable income for the synagogue and helps position us as a leading meeting venue among Jewish and non-Jewish organizations in the Greater Hartford area. Having Josh Cohen creating and spearheading many wonderful events certainly elevated the Emanuel as "the place to be!"

I am proud of our efforts in obtaining meaningful Federal FEMA grants, which will make the Emanuel Synagogue a safer place. Special thanks to the FEMA squad: Howard *(continued on page 7)* Smith, Tom Mastronarde and Joyce Hyde for leading and managing this significant effort. Together with Jon Colangelo from the Jewish Federation and our internal security team, we made sure our members and guests felt safe during the High Holy Days.

I was also heavily involved with membership retention and membership recruiting, speaking with significant number of current and potential members every week, resulting in higher retention and higher recruitment rates.

Most of all my accomplishments were made possible thanks to collaboration with others. I hardly did anything totally by myself! I am happy I had the privilege of working with an excellent and diverse team, all having one thing in common: the interest and good and welfare of the synagogue. I cannot possibly name all the wonderful people I worked with; however, I must mention several key volunteers with whom I worked very closely: Howard Smith, Tom Mastronarde, Bonnie & Rick Lasker, Amy Dembo, Regina Miller, Ken Malley, Alan Goodman, Arlan Lieblick, Lisa Sadinsky, Mitchell Jaffe, Sheila Silverman, Joanne Pasternack, Michael Kamins, Mickey Libbin, Jeff

Adler, Fern Cohen, Tamar Margolis, Randie Fierberg, Jeff Cohen, Joel Kent, Ben Engel, Marsha Wolfberg and many others. Thank you to all of you from the bottom of my heart. It has been a bumpy road at times, but what a ride!

I would like to thank Mel Simon for thinking out of the box and hiring me without any nonprofit experience. When he did that, he certainly took a risk, but I hope I was able to prove to Mel and to others that it was well worth the risk. I remember working closely with Mel during the pandemic, doing all we could to keep our members and guests safe and, with Barry Feigenbaum's leadership, installing advanced cameras for Zoom and livestreaming services, which we still use regularly today.

I would also like to thank Rabbi Small for being my biggest supporter and partner from day one and for being my mentor, advisor and confidante. Thank you Rabbi Small, for all you have done for me, for your trust, love and friendship.

Special thanks to Ken Simon, our past president, and to Reesa Olins, our current president, for the countless hours we spent working together, for the trust, collaboration and for your continuous support.

I am also proud of creating healthy relationships and establishing a culture of teamwork and collaboration among staff, clergy, lay leaders and volunteers, making work at the Emanuel less stressful, more collaborative, and much more enjoyable and fun. I always make efforts to keep employees happy and content; after all, research proves that happy employees are more productive and efficient. Having a healthy sense of humor also helped in making a more pleasant workplace for all.

The decision to return home to Israel is rooted in my desire to be closer to my 92-year-old father, who is in poor health. I would like to spend time with him before it is too late. Simi and I also want to be close to our young daughters, to our older kids and to the rest of the family.

Dear Emanuel members, I am saying *L'hitraot* (in Hebrew, "See you again") and not goodbye, as I know we shall see each other again, here in West Hartford or in Israel. We will be sure to pass on our contact information when we find a home in Israel.

It will emphasize the different historical periods of the Cuban Jewish Community, the presence of Jews in different cities of the country, the most important Jewish places, and the most important Jewish personalities.

Thursday, Dec. 14, 8:30 p.m., on Zoom: Dr. Brian Gordon Hillman, assistant professor in the department of Philosophy and Religious Studies at Towson University, will examine "The Beginnings of Kabbalah" examining the fundamental theological questions that gave rise to the tradition of Jewish texts and ideas known as Kabbalah. The program historically locates Kabbalah's origins in Medieval Europe and considers how Kabbalah arose, in part, as a response to philosophical conceptions of the divine. The program will then explore some early Kabbalistic texts to understand how Kabbalists understood both the nature of divinity and the relationship between G-d and the world with a focus on humanity's place therein.

Sunday, Dec. 17, 1:00 p.m, on Zoom: Evan Kapros, who was born in Greece, moved to Ireland, and now lives in Barcelona, will conduct a **Tour of Jewish Greece**, including the history of Greek Jewry, a unique combination of Sephardic, Ashkenazi, and Romaniote communities with roots in Spain, the Balkans, and going back all the way to the Roman Empire. He will explain this rich history, and will talk about the social perceptions prevalent in contemporary Greek society concerning Jewish identities, including the language, food, and music of the community.



EMANUEL SYNAGOGUE HOUSE COMMITTEE REPORT OCTOBER 2023

Grant Applications

2023 NAA – Neighborhood Assistance Act: Energy related grant through State of CT. We have been approved for up to \$150,000 for our HVAC replacement project. We have contacted Avangrid and Eversource for possible participation.

NSGP/FEMA Projects Report from Tom Mastronarde

- Installation of the Video Door Intercom and Entry System is 100% complete and is operational.
- Installation of the Security Camera System is 100% complete. The system is operational and the new digital camera images have been interfaced with the Mutualink police emergency notification system.
- Proposals for the Courtyard Security Fence are under review. Pending approval by FEMA grant administrators, installation projected for November.
- Proposals for decorative Safety Bollards on the outer perimeter of the Sukkah Garden area are being reviewed Pending approval by FEMA grant administrators, installation projected for November.
- An updated Purchase Order for the Cell Phone Booster System is ready to be placed pending approval by FEMA grant administrators of budget adjustments for the five projects within the overall Emanuel grant project plan. It is expected that equipment will be installed within one month of the issuance of the Purchase Order.
- Bids for the Chapel Window Protection project have been received. Further action is on hold.
- Water leaks in the roof above the Silverman Hall have been repaired. Additional heavy rains did not result in additional leaks. The solar collectors were removed by the solar installer and the roof shingles were stripped in that area by the roofing contractor. The cause of the leak was discovered to be a hole through the shingles and the roof deck for a mounting device. This hole was drilled in the wrong location by the solar installers and improperly patched. The existing roof shingles in that area have been stripped and replaced with all new material. The ceiling will need to be repainted in the area where paint flaked after water destroyed the bond of the paint to the ceiling tiles.
- Sanctuary and Koret Hall rooftop HVAC Systems have been replaced. Items to be completed are installation of a safety guardrail and permit inspection.

• Electronic Yarhzeit Displays in the Sanctuary and Chapel have been installed and are operational. The lettering above the sanctuary unit is to be installed, but due to the nature of the existing paneling material, the method of attaching the letters is being revised.

• Mutualink System is complete and functioning with the West Hartford Police.

Future Projects

• **HVAC** – The HVAC units serving the Library and the Youth Lounge are also 34 years old. The Youth Lounge unit recently had a minor fan failure and was repaired at a cost of \$951.28. Quoted replacement cost of the two units, including a rooftop electrical panel and wiring is \$30,000 at this time. The decision has been made to defer this project.

• **Parking Lot and Two Catch Basins Repair** — Contractor has been hired. Repairs expected this month.

• Carpet in Emanuel School Classrooms and Hallway Level 3 is worn, faded, stretched and damaged by plumbing repairs. It is a tripping hazard, and is in need of replacement. Estimated cost for replacement is \$15,000.

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REFLECTIONS ON THE MONTH OF ELUL: INSPIRATION, MOTIVATION, CELEBRATION

The following are excerpts from a d'var Torah delivered by Judy Silver in the Emanuel Sanctuary on Shabbat Shoftim August 19, 2023.

The Hebrew month Elul connects the past year with the coming year. It is a time to reflect on where we stand, and where we should be going.

It is a month during which every day except Shabbat we blow the shofar during morning minyan and both morning and evening recite the 27th Psalm that begins:

"The Lord is my Light and my

Salvation. Whom need I fear? The Lord is the stronghold of my life — whom (and I often say what) need I dread?"

The month of Elul is considered the month of Divine mercy and forgiveness. Elul is the "getting ready" time for the New Year.

For some it is cooking and cleaning and calling. I strongly believe it is more importantly a spiritual preparation, a time when after looking back on the past, we need to gather INSPIRATION, MOTIVATION, and CELEBRATION to be our best in the coming year.

Biblically, EluI represents the time period when Moses ascended Mt. Sinai for the third time.

The first time going up the mountain, he received the stone tablets of the 10 Commandments.

After seeing the debacle of the Golden Calf incident and smashing the tablets, he ascended the mountain a second time to ask G-d's forgiveness for what the people had done.

When he went up the third time, he asked G-d to re-inscribe the 10 Commandments...that last trip lasted from the first of Elul to the 10th day of Tishrei when we celebrate Yom Kippur, during which time Moses obtained G-d's whole-hearted forgiveness and reconciliation with the people of Israel.

For me personally, Elul is yahrzeit month — a time when I am observing 5 yahrzeits and remembering 5 people who had a profound influence at different stages of my life.

Nana was the first widow I knew on a day-to-day basis, as she came to live with us after Grandpa died on my 16th birthday. Much of what I have been able to do as a widow, I learned from Nana for the next 33 years. She was and is my INSPIRATION to move forward on my own, knowing there is much life left to be lived.

Gentle, loving Grandpa taught me all about wrestling during my Friday night sleepovers. I was 5. Sitting together on the sofa in front of the little TV with our Ginger Ale, neither of us were dreaming that I would one day have two sons who would wrestle, and I would need to be present



and understanding about that sport, putting aside my feelings to understand theirs. A successful businessman, Grandpa had a kindness in dealing with people every day that I like to think I inherited from him.

That was only the beginning of the many things we had in common and what we shared over the years. She was a very special friend who INSPIRED everyone and me who knew her with her amazing creativity, unselfishness, thoughtfulness, and loyalty. The flowers on our luncheon tables today are cut from a bush I planted at the time of Nancy's first yahrzeit 18 years ago.

If Nancy was like a sister, Phil Handler of blessed memory was like a brother, especially when mine passed away.

The only times we ever held hands was at the end of Havdalah service in the chapel on Saturday nights. Phil's hand would be in my right and Cantor Sandy Cohn, of blessed memory, had his hand in my left.

Not at all a romantic relationship, Phil and I shared a special kinship that formed when we each lost the love of our lives six days apart. Twice a day every day Phil and I attended minyan services, in person and then on Zoom, for 5 years. Phil, ever the professional photographer, had a lens aside from the one on his camera that allowed me to see much of life from a different perspective. He also gave me some new family who then honored me by asking me to preside at his unveiling last August.

Phil always MOTIVATED me to continue to try my hardest at every task I undertook.

Herb, my best friend and soulmate for more than 50 years, was my everything. He taught me so much in our years together, there would not be time to list them all. The most important lessons concern what I have learned during the past 7 years since he has been gone: that the "everything" did not die with him. That everything is everywhere, every day, including in this room.

My INSPIRATION, my MOTIVATION, my CELEBRATION...

As I observe these 5 yahrzeits I am reflecting on the past, of course, But I am trying to concentrate on what they taught me and what they gave me, that I can refresh and take with me into the New Year.

Elul is a time to look back, but it is especially a time to look ahead and to plan how we will journey forward in the coming year. I believe that in asking for forgiveness we also need to make changes in how we live.

Everyone here has someone to remember who is no longer here. Rather than a sadness or thoughts of an empty chair, let the gifts those people gave you be what MOTIVATES, INSPIRES, AND CELEBRATES you in 5784.
